James E. Moss Elementary is located in the City of South Salt Lake. We serve approximately 620 students, 94 percent of whom qualify for free or reduced price lunch. Moss Elementary has a vibrant, diverse population comprised of many immigrant and refugee families. Over 35 languages and 51 countries are represented in the school.

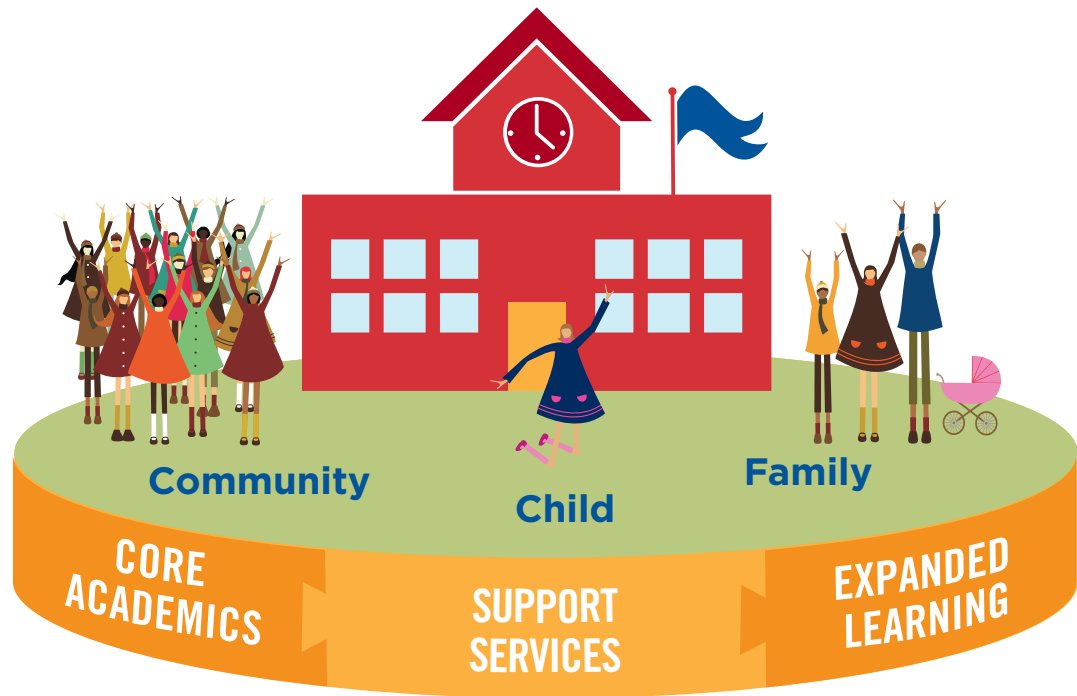
