With the help of our dedicated community partners, donors, volunteers, and advocates, we are making measurable strides toward achieving our outcomes.

Below are just a few of our accomplishments from 2018-2019.

Proof Point Status

In February 2019, the Promise Partnership was designated as a "Proof Point" community by



StriveTogether. This designation recognizes United Way of Salt Lake and our many partners for our community alignment, data-driven decision making, policy changes to support systems change, and

dedication of the Promise Partnership Regional Council. There are only 10 other communities in the country with this distinction.

Spotlight Honoree by the Carnegie Foundation

United Way of Salt Lake and StriveTogether were selected as a Spotlight Honoree by the Carnegie Foundation for the work of the Chronic Absence Network, and asked to present at the Spotlight on Quality Symposium in D.C. and Carnegie Summit on Improvement in Education. This spotlight showcases the power of coaching diverse communities around a new and disciplined way of working.

Grassroots Fellowship Launched

In 2018, Promise Partners focused their early childhood outreach in South Salt Lake, a city where a significant number of parents speak Spanish, French, Arabic, Nepali, Somali, Tongan, or Swahili. As part of this effort, United Way of Salt Lake launched its grassroots fellowship, a leadership development program for young adults in Promise Communities. The first cohort included three young leaders from South Salt Lake who spoke Arabic, Spanish, and Somali. With these "trusted messengers," language and cultural barriers were minimized and the grassroots team was able to double the number of early childhood screenings completed in just three months and connect with over 500 parents of young children.

Policy Success

We had another successful legislative session, helping pass a number of bills that move United Way of Salt Lake's priorities forward. Here are some of the notable results of the bills we worked on:

Early Childhood Education

SB166 School Readiness Amendments received its full funding request. SB166 will provide \$12 million in ongoing funds for school, private, and home-based preschool programs that help children start kindergarten ready to learn.

HB47 Early Childhood Coordination Amendments will help improve policy decision-making, alignment, and coordination of programs and services for children ages zero to six.

College Access

HB260 Access Utah Promise Scholarship Program passed. HB260 will build a statewide pipeline to college access and completion for students who otherwise would not attend. This ground-breaking legislation creates opportunity and leverages existing resources. The bill was funded with \$2 million in ongoing funds.

Mental Health Services for Students

Also funded and passed was HB373 Student Support Amendments. This bill will infuse \$26 million in ongoing funds to provide targeted mental health support and trauma-informed care to students in schools. Mental health services has long been a top identified need in the schools where UWSL works.




UWSL invests donor dollars to create social change that lasts. The 2018/2019 results show an impact for the schools, communities, and regions where we work, proving large-scale change is possible.




3RD GRADE READING PROFICIENCY

Nour was barely a teenager when an unexpected knock came at the door of her home in Syria. On the other side were armed soldiers, there to arrest her father for reasons that weren't clear.

After his release, Nour and her family left the only life they'd ever known to seek refuge in Salt Lake City. The transition was difficult, but the resources provided to them through Cottonwood High School, one of UWSL's community schools, helped them adjust quickly. Nour learned English, found a part-time job, and joined the

Mentor 2.0 program, where she was paired with a mentor to help her prepare for college.

Nour is now attending Salt Lake Community College. She plans to study psychology or pre-law with a focus on the refugee population.

> "I want my name to be remembered," she said. "(Where people say,) 'Nour, she's the one who helped."
