

Reading Interventions Make a Difference



School was never easy for Chad. During his time at South Kearns Elementary School, Chad needed extra help in almost every subject, particularly reading. His mother, Tracey, said he hated everything about school and felt like he would never be a good student. But that all changed when Chad entered sixth grade, when he massively improved his reading skills thanks to a new reading intervention program and leveling of the school library.

The intervention program gave struggling students like Chad extra reading help with an instructional coach, which massively boosted his confidence in reading. The leveling of the library helped him pick out books to improve his skills, rather than books too difficult for him. By the end of the year, Chad was reading at grade level for the first time ever. "(He has) a passion for education now," Tracey said, "which is something I didn't know I'd ever see from (him)."
